6:30 pm | Opening Roundtable: The Upside-Down World: The Crises Continue... and the Struggles?

The hopes of a 20th century marching towards socialism were buried with the collapse of "real socialism". The hopes that the new century would announce the end of history were buried in 2008 and by the crisis of what was believed to be the irreversible neoliberal globalization. The deepening of inequalities between and within countries, the rise of China, xenophobic exacerbation and warmongering militarism that fuel conflicts and bring back the threat of widespread war, the climate crisis, the advances of the far right – these are elements of a reality that challenges many of our convictions and theoretical references, as well as the search for paths for the struggles of the exploited, oppressed, discriminated, and violated. This panel aims to discuss the continuities and ruptures of this upside-down world and explore the horizons that can be glimpsed for emancipatory social struggles.

This panel proposes to reflect on how disaster capitalism—a concept that describes the capitalist appropriation and commodification of environmental crises—manifests itself in the era of climate change, exacerbating inequalities and increasing the vulnerability of historically marginalized social groups. The debate articulates critical analyses of the mechanisms of disaster production and management, the dispute over the meanings of justice and reparation, and the forms of resistance and organization of affected populations in Brazil.

9 am | Roundtable: Planning and Technical Advisory Work in Contexts of Social Conflict

Experiences of popular planning and technical advisory work in Brazil have generated political spaces for challenging traditional ways of planning territory. These practices, in contexts of conflict, interfere in processes of social production of urban space and, in some cases, constitute new social subjects of planning and produce new repertoires such as popular plans, social cartographies, among others. The reflection comes from researchers who work in planning and advisory processes and bring conceptual and methodological questions, as well as the specificities of the experiences in their context. Starting from practices, contributions are presented to the critical theory of urban planning and to the struggle for just cities.

9 am | Roundtable: Geographies of Race and the City

This panel will discuss ways of spatializing racism and anti-racism struggles in cities. From a decolonial perspective, which takes racism as one of the structural forms of domination and exploitation of capitalism, race shapes cities. In different ways, whether in the subalternization of individuals and groups (including structural and state violence), in the appropriation, disqualification and forms of oppression of cultural matrices and their practitioners, in the production of inequalities, in the production of urban and territorial planning, and consequently, in the struggles that oppose such bio(neco)political guidelines, racial relations mark our urban spaces. The panel will bring together researchers who have been focusing on these realities in Brazil, Hispanic Latin American countries, the United States and South Africa, not seeking to compare, but rather through a multi-scalar perspective of the relationships between race and the city.

1:30 pm | Roundtable: The State, Regulatory Restructuring, Infrastructure Projects and Public Policies

This panel proposes a debate on the dismantling of regulatory and institutional arrangements and how the consolidation of the neoliberal project through socio-technical mechanisms has paved the way, on a global scale, for the expansion of the private domain and for a political rationality present in all dimensions of social life. Neoliberalism intensified under the hegemony of fictitious capital and expands through the constant creation of new classes of assets aimed at appropriating globally dispersed future income flows—articulating itself with a neo-extractivist logic that involves increasingly varied practices of income appropriation. The debate articulates analyses on how, in this context, the neoliberal agenda articulates and condenses in the arenas of the State through regulatory restructuring, Infrastructure Projects and Public Policies.
